

The Process: Transcript, resume, writing sample and application must be submitted. When accepted into the program, the student is randomly paired with a participating judge. Students will then arrange schedule and hours directly with the judge to whom they are assigned.

Who can apply: Any minority law student who will have completed at least his or her first year of law school by the spring of 2008. Students must demonstrate strong research, writing and analytical abilities, and sign releases so that information can be obtained from faculty and/or administrators of their schools.

Funding: For the summer of 2008, interns will be provided with a small stipend, due to the generosity of private donors.

Credit: In lieu of accepting a stipend, students can elect to intern for course credit if their law schools permit.

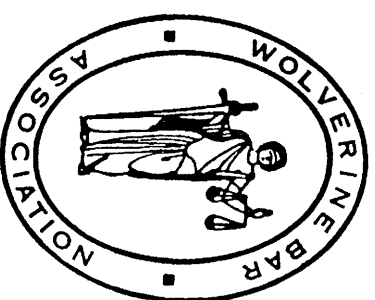

Purpose: To facilitate the applications of qualified minority law students to federal judges, and to assist the judges in locating such students.

Goal: To expand judicial clerkship opportunities for minority students.

Requirements: Students are required to complete a minimum of 125 hours in chambers between May-August, 2008, and to attend at least three firm sponsored seminars.

Application Deadline: April 18, 2008.

Location: Participating judges are located in Detroit, Ann Arbor, Bay City and Flint. Every effort will be made to place students at their first location choice.

Educational Opportunities:

Students will have the opportunity to work directly with federal judges and their clerks in preparing bench memoranda on pending cases. Students will also view, first hand, the unfolding of pre-trial matters and can observe settlement conferences, final pre-trial conferences, trials and motion hearings.
